11 12 13 14	WHEREAS , the City of South Fulton ("City") is a municipal corporation duly organized and existing under the laws of the State of Georgia;				
15 16	WHEREAS , the duly elected governing authority of the City is the Mayor and Council thereof ("City Council");				
17 18	WHEREAS , the State of Georgia has a painful history of horrid abuses and atrocities committed against African descendants of slavery;				
19 20	WHEREAS , in 1861, according to U.S. Census records, approximately 462,198 African descendants were enslaved within the State of Georgia;				
21 22	WHEREAS , on January 19, 1861, Georgia voted to secede from the Union and join the Confederate States of America;				
23 24 25	WHEREAS , the Civil War ensued in which the Confederate States of America was defeated by the Union, with the April 16, 1865 Battle of Columbus being officially recognized by the State of Georgia as the "last battle" of the Civil War;				
26 27	WHEREAS, shortly thereafter, on December 6th, 1865, the 13th Amendment was enacted which abolished slavery in the United States;				
28 29	WHEREAS , the State of Georgia did not re-enter the Union until July 15, 1870, as the last of the former Confederate states to be re-admitted;				
30 31 32 33	WHEREAS, during the 1890s, the State of Georgia passed a wide variety of Jim Crow laws that mandated racial segregation, separation in public facilities and a system of discrimination that saturated nearly all aspects of the lives of African descendants of slavery in Georgia;				
34 35 36	WHEREAS , African descendants of slavery experienced disproportionate unemployment rates and reduced opportunities to fully participate in the Georgia job market;				

37 **WHEREAS**, African descendants of slavery were segregated from mainstream 38 education and through discriminatory educational policies in Georgia;

WHEREAS, African descendants of slavery received inadequate access to proper health care as exemplified by disproportionate morbidities and mortality rates and discriminatory medical practices such as involuntary sterilizations, denial of adequate testing, denial of preventative and curative procedures;

43 **WHEREAS**, African descendants of slavery have been unjustly targeted by law 44 enforcement and criminal justice procedures, incarcerated at disproportionate rates;

45 **WHEREAS**, Government sponsored racism only began to erode in the State of 46 Georgia in the middle of the twentieth century, when a series of federally mandated civil 47 rights reforms, which included the 1954 Brown v. Board of Education decision, Civil Rights 48 Act of 1964 and 1965 Voting Rights Act;

- 49 **WHEREAS**, understanding and acknowledging the history of racism, intolerance 50 and prejudice in the State of Georgia is critical in ensuring that history doesn't repeat 51 itself;
- 52 **WHEREAS**, systemic racism was created over centuries and will take time to 53 dismantle;
- 54 **WHEREAS**, the City is committed to eradicating government sponsored racism, 55 social bias and prejudice within the State of Georgia;
- 56 **WHEREAS**, the City Council desires through this Resolution to acknowledge the 57 history of racism, intolerance and prejudice in the State of Georgia affirm its commitment 58 to eradicating the negative and harmful effects within the City of Georgia's pervasive 59 history of racism, intolerance and discrimination; and
- 60 **WHEREAS**, this Resolution is in the best interests of the health and general 61 welfare of the City and State of Georgia.
- THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOUTH FULTON, GEORGIA, HEREBY
 RESOLVES as follows:
 <u>Section 1.</u>
 Commitment. The City hereby affirms its commitment to eradicating the effects of Georgia's systemically racist past practices negatively impacting the City.
 b. Call on State and Federal Government. The City hereby calls on the State of Coergia and the federal government to address and eccept avetemically racist
- Georgia and the federal government to address and access systemically racist past practices against African descendants of slavery within the state and nation,

and implement policymaking and funding for reparations at the state and nationallevels.

- **c. Call on Other Entities**. The City further calls on other organizations, businesses and governments throughout the nation to address and access the negative impact of racism within their own structures and programs, and resolve to address the lingering impacts of the nation's dark history of systemic racism.
- **d. Recommendations on Reparations.** The City hereby directs the City Manager within the next year to assess and report back on actions within the City which address the areas below, as well as, where practical and underserved, short, medium and long-term recommendations for reparations through local and/or interjurisdictional policies and programs which assist with:
 - 1. Boosting economic mobility and opportunity within the City;
 - 2. Repairing the damage caused by public and private systemic racism in Georgia;
 - 3. Increasing African descendants of slavery's homeownership and access to other affordable housing;
 - 4. Increasing African descendants of slavery's business ownership and career opportunities and strategies to grow equity and generational wealth;
 - 5. Closing any unjust gaps in health care, education and employment;
 - 6. Enhancing neighborhood safety and fairness within criminal justice;
 - 7. Improving healthy food availability and access;
 - 8. Enhancing resident well-being, effective use of natural community spaces and environmental justice;
 - 9. Supporting youths by providing more comprehensive, holistic services and programming to prevent gaps in the City's social safety net;
- 10. Making the City a model city for racial and social justice; and
- 112 11. Expanding community and collaborative outreach consistent with the goals of 113 this Resolution, such as opportunities for joining N'COBRA and other 114 organizations.

e. Strategic Alliance. The City Manager is further hereby instructed to cause for the
 City to join the Government Alliance for Racial Equity, a national network of
 governments working together to achieve racial equity and advance opportunities
 for all.

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122 <u>Section 2.</u> It is hereby declared to be the intention of the City Council that: (a) All 123 sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses and phrases of this Resolution are or were, 124 upon their enactment, believed by the City Council to be fully valid, enforceable and 125 constitutional.

(b) To the greatest extent allowed by law, each and every section, paragraph, sentence,
clause or phrase of this Resolution is severable from every other section, paragraph,
sentence, clause or phrase of this Resolution. No section, paragraph, sentence, clause
or phrase of this Resolution is mutually dependent upon any other section, paragraph,
sentence, clause or phrase of this Resolution.

(c) In the event that any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or section of this Resolution
shall, for any reason whatsoever, be declared invalid, unconstitutional or otherwise
unenforceable by the valid judgment or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, it is
the express intent of the City Council that such invalidity, unconstitutionality or
unenforceability shall, to the greatest extent allowed by law, not render invalid,
unconstitutional or otherwise unenforceable any of the remaining phrases, clauses,
sentences, paragraphs or sections of the Resolution.

<u>Section 3.</u> The City Attorney and City Clerk are authorized to make non-substantive
 editing and renumbering revisions to this Resolution for proofing, codification, and
 supplementation purposes. The final version of all resolutions shall be filed with the City
 Clerk.

<u>Section 4.</u> The effective date of this Resolution shall be the date of adoption, unless
 provided otherwise by the City Charter or state and/or federal law.
